LOCK DOWN YOUR LOGIN

Your usernames and passwords are not enough to protect key accounts like email, banking and social media. Strengthen online accounts and use strong authentication tools – like biometrics, security keys or a unique, one-time code through an app on your mobile device – whenever offered.



KEEP A CLEAN MACHINE

Keep all software on internetconnected devices – including personal computers, smartphones and tablets – current to reduce risk of infection from ransomware and malware.



THROW IT OUT Links in email, tweets, posts and online advertising are often how

cybercriminals try to compromise your information. If it looks suspicious, even if you know the source, it's best to delete or, if appropriate, mark it as junk.



Protect your valuable work, usic, photos and other digital


